## Hints for Reading Cubby and Coco with a child(ren):

- Set aside technology and other distractions
- Pause to give time for the children to sound out the word
- Take turns reading out loud
- Stop reading at different points, discuss what has happened . . . imagine what is next
- PRAISE your reader(s)
- Use $\$ 20.00$ (coins and dollars) while reading the story to reinforce counting coins and
 coin recognition. 15 dollar bills and/or coins, 14 quarters, 12 dimes, 5 nickels and 5 pennies.


## Vocabulary:

Need: Something we must have to survive Basic Needs: Essential items for survival. Food and water, home (rent or mortgage), clothing, transportation, healthcare, and air
Want: Something we would like to have Budget: A plan for how you will spend and save your money
Financial Decision: A choice you make about how to spend and save money
Emergency Fund: Money you save to pay for the cost of meeting needs when unexpected things happen
Goal: Something you want to achieve in the future

## Suggestions for Financial Well-Being Conversation with Reader:

- What needs and wants were important to Cubby, Coco, Mr. Squirrel and the robin?
- Describe how Cubby and Coco earned their money. Did Cubby and Coco have a goal and a plan for their money?
- Did Cubby and Coco have to make a financial decision (ice cream) about their money? Why was Cubby a good friend?
- Was there an emergency that Cubby and Coco encountered?
- Did Coco and Cubby have money left over? Did they have a plan to spend this money?



## Group Sharing on Financial Well-Being:

- Do you get an allowance? How do you spend and save your money?
- Have you ever wanted an item and you were told that you had to wait or couldn't have the item? Was it a need or a want?
- Do you have a savings account? Are you waiting to buy something?
- If you had 20 dollars, how would you spend your money? Discuss the 50/30/20 method for savings and spending ( $50 \%$ for needs, $30 \%$ for wants, $20 \%$ for saving).

- Is there something in the classroom we need an emergency fund for?


## Sharing and caring

Broadview FCU supports helping youth understand how to develop self-management skills, healthy relationships, working with personal and community resources, and asking for help for self and others.

- Cubby and Coco like adventures together, how do they physically get around? Is walking good for you?
- What happened to the robin's home (nest)? How did the robin communicate this? How did Cubby feel when the robin shared his story? How did Coco understand what the robin needed?"
- How did these two friends solve the robin's challenge?
- What was the good deed that Cubby and Coco did for Mr. Squirrel?
- Did these two friends give their money away or did they use their skills?
- How does Coco express excitement? How does the robin communicate the story about his nest?
- In what way does Coco take care of Cubby?
- How do Cubby and Coco positively impact their corner of the world?

- What was the hardest decision Cubby and Coco had to make about spending or saving their money (Coco wanted ice cream)? Did Cubby encourage Coco to spend their money? Was Cubby a good friend?
- Are you a problem solver? Share an example.
- Do you like to ask for help? Share an example.
- How does it make you feel to be kind to someone?
- If you had extra money to give, how would you help others?
